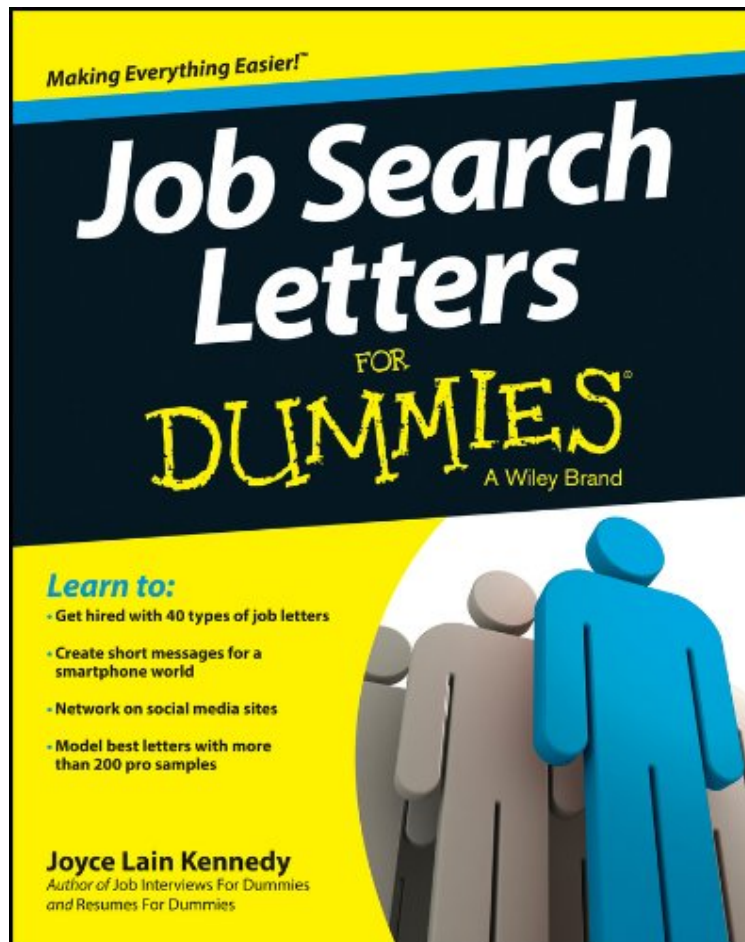

A friend of mine opened up his own business. He hired a P.R. professional to coach him on how to promote his new enterprise so it didn't have to spend months or years in the red 'catching fire'. The P.R. person gave him a list of excellent ideas - quite innovative and all seemingly highly effective too. My friend, after the P.R. woman's presentation said to me, "These things would assure my success but I can't do any of them". Why did he say that? Because the type of self promotion the P.R. person suggested went against his personal grain. This book is solid and dense with information which may not be new to this book, but for sure I've never seen before. Here are two examples of many dozens. Do you know what a 'prezi' is or how to use it in a job search? I didn't. Did you know there are Web sites you can copy and then paste a job ad into and the site will analyze the ad and tell you what key words you must

use in your cover letter to heavily associate your letter to your potential employer's needs? I tested one of these sites and was astounded at how easy it made cover letter writing. The main organization of the book are chapters covering some specific of job seeking along with commentary from the author about the sample letters (which follow). These letters are all written not by the book's author but by professional resume or cover letter writers all of who are listed in the back of the book's reference pages. In addition, the book goes into job related material - not just how to write cover letters. For example, there is solid information on how to ask for a raise - obviously for someone already on the job rather than on the outside looking in. It's a fairly comprehensive career book in many ways. Now to return to the problem. Just reading that you must use proper grammar in your letters and giving a half dozen 'right and wrong' examples does not make a grammarian. Knowing prezis exist doesn't mean you know how to make a good one or if it'd be suitable for your job search. Knowing LinkedIn exists doesn't mean you can use it effectively to network into your dream job. Knowing that social media sites are deep searched by employers to screen out employees who may be trouble based on their supposedly anonymous postings doesn't give you the power to scrub the shadow Web for your youthful or not so youthful indiscretions. Then there is the personality issue. People can admire the sample letters and even try to imitate them, but few will succeed to the degree these professionally written letters do. Of course, there is always the resource of finding the letter or other object you like and hiring the professional who made it to generate up one or more from you. In the end, for most who will read this book, that's the end solution. I doubt most folks can come close to matching the sample letters in this book so they can either fall well short or hire the pro. Of course, you may not need a cover letter or resume of the first water to succeed in your job search. Perhaps the other tips, such as the key word generator, and your own talent will be enough.
